Dear Dr P[]

Please note that I wish to cancel my second appointment, set for 27 May 2008.

Following further consideration since the consultation on 7 May 2008, I have come to the conclusion that I do not need a medical assessment for the purpose of my claim against KPMG in the employment tribunal.

Should my claim reach the hearing stage, as these hearings are public, my main consideration will be the ability to add KPMG on my website as another party to my case of what can happen to an honest, decent, law-abiding leaseholder who 'dares' to challenge a landlord's fraudulent service charge demands - and concurrently, the supporting infrastructure comprising of lawyers, courts, accountants, surveyors, etc. (My 'crime' is that I 'dare' to demand the rights I have been told I have the right to demand).

For your information, in reply to your suggestion, (within c. half-an-hour of the consultation), that I book myself "*into a clinic for two weeks*"; my non-expert but, carefully considered opinion, is that the parties listed on the attached copy of my 6 May 2008 entry on my online diary¹ (www.leasehold-outrage.com) are those *in dire need* of psychiatric treatment.

To these must of course be added the driver behind all of their actions: Mr Andrew Ladsy, 'my landlord' / person fronting the ownership of my block who, in my equally non-expert opinion, I view as a psychopath. It is beggars belief that such a man (and his associates?) can so freely command such outrageous acts against me (and my fellow leaseholders) - in the 21st century, in a country that calls itself 'civilised' and has signed-up to the European Convention on Human Rights.

As to your comment, (in the early part of the consultation), that if I cannot work for a company because of my experience with KPMG in 2007, I could "*do charity work*": I view exposing the unbelievable details of my case on my website as my 'charity work' - as I know for a fact that my website is of help to other leaseholders. Considering what it takes to do what I am doing, it must surely count as one of the most demanding charity work around.

Having failed to gain justice and redress, I very dearly hope that my exposing the actions by the parties involved in my case will spare other leaseholders from going through the horrendous suffering I have been made, and continue to endure since 2002. As I said to you: "*that's my way of 'giving back' to this society*". Unfortunately, this 'good cause' which, 'thanks' to Mr Ladsy and his aides, added to my bad luck in opting to buy a leasehold flat in the block - chose me - happens to be one that adversely concerns some very powerful people in this country.
