



In February 2005 the carpet was removed in the entrance corridor, as well as the extra boarding that provided added noise insulation – leaving the base floor boards exposed

By 5 June 2005, the entrance had remained in the same state



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By 26 June 2005, some flooring started to be placed...

“It must be remembered that the property is located in Knightsbridge only some fifty metres from Harrods and therefore the standard of decoration should reflect its location”

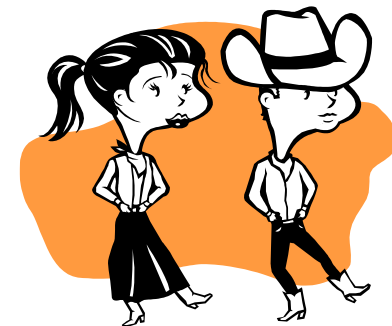

“It was accepted that Jefferson House was in a prestigious location and that the lessees would expect refurbishment to be commensurate with the area...”

This was prompted by Mr Brian Gale’s specification to use, for the internal decoration, what is probably the most expensive paint on the market.

Can the approach adopted for the flooring in the entrance corridor be regarded as being “commensurate” with a building “of this quality” in a “prestigious location”?

One thing for sure: **the entrance corridor is excellent for tap dancing** and those living in the surrounding flats, not only on the same floor, as well as below, but also, in all likelihood, above, can be guaranteed the benefit of hearing it without leaving their flats
